Unfaithful to daydreams

WORKPLACE is delighted to announce 'Unfaithful to day-dreams' a solo presentation of Portuguese artist Hugo Canoilas' work at its Mayfair space.

The works in the exhibition reference myriad sources from the philosophy, literature and cultural ideologies of Modernism – from existential philosopher Søren Kierkegaard, to jazz musician and composer Ornette Coleman. Canoilas' paintings are informed by the dynamics that underpin contemporary culture and are explored by the artist through the relationship of text, collage, and painting. The exhibition looks retrospectively at



Canoilas' practice, bringing together a series of 20 paintings on canvas, aluminium and paper.

In 'Not even one more soldier' Canoilas has photographed a makeshift intervention in an urban environment. The words NEM MAIS UM SOLDADO are stenciled upon a discarded plank of wood. Printed in black and white, and collaged over similar photographs, Canoilas has then painted over the surface in a bright yellow at odds with the muted scene. The resulting image oscillates between protest and gesture and is both poignant and potent. No meu sonho você (In My Dream You), 2013, is a collage of photographic images of a womans face taken from multiple angles, ripped and pasted together onto a sheet of unstretched canvas. The work is portrait of an anonymous woman, surreal, cinematic and kaleidoscopic in style. It emulates a fragment of a memory or a dream.

This relationship between the immediate yet ambiguous nature of seeing an image, with the slower yet rationally coherent activity of reading text is central to Canoilas' practice. Through exploiting the resulting dissonance between the two visual languages Canoilas moves towards what Martinican poet and philosopher Èdouard Glissant describes as Creolisation - achieving an openness towards the other through a composite hybridity. For Canoilas this aesthetic strategy emerges from a Postcolonial critique of his own Portuguese identity, and seeks to move the viewer both to an awareness of sociopolitical undercurrents, and inwardly towards a position between reading and interpretation, enabling a psychological projection of an inner world.

Hugo Canoilas was born in 1977 in Lisbon, Portugal and studied at Caldas da Rainha, Portugal and the Royal College of Art, UK; He lives and works in Vienna, Austria.
